March starts the spring migration and breeding season for our birds. Several of the species seen early in the month will be gone by the end, or by mid-April. Some will molt before their departure - with scruffy-looking feathers replaced by sleek, gorgeous plumage. Of those who stay here all year, some (e.g. Song Sparrows) are already seeking mates and defending territories.
